



Pastor's Report 2016

A Journey to Hope

This year Palm Schwenkfelder Church was a lead sponsor for the Upper Perk Relay for Life. The event for 2016 was held at Camelot Park and I was invited to be a part of the closing ceremony. In addition to a part of Dr. Seuss' <u>Oh, the Places You'll Go!</u> I also shared a portion of the book When Breath Becomes Air by Paul Kalanithi. Kalanithi

was a neurosurgeon and scientist diagnosed with terminal lung cancer, who passed away in 2015. His final words through this book, he shares with us and his infant daughter Cady:

Everyone succumbs to finitude. I suspect I am not the only one who reaches this pluperfect state. Most ambitions are either achieved or abandoned; either way, they belong to the past. The future, instead of the ladder towards the goals of life, flattens out into the perpetual present. Money, status, all the vanities the preacher of Ecclesiastes described hold so little interest: a chasing after wind indeed.

Yet one thing cannot be robbed of her futurity: our daughter, Cady. I hope I'll live long enough that she has some memory of me. Words have a longevity I do not. I had thought I could leave her a series of letters- but what would they say? I don't know what this girl will be like when she is fifteen; I don't even know if she'll take to the nickname we've given her. There is perhaps only one thing to say to this infant, who is all future, overlapping briefly with me, whose life, barring the improbable, is all but past.

That message is simple:

When you come to one of the many moments in life where you must give an account of yourself, provide a ledger of what you have been, and done, and meant to the world, do not, I pray, discount that you filled a dying man's days with a sated joy, a joy unknown to me in all my prior years, a joy that does not hunger for more and more but rests, satisfied. In that time, right now, that is an enormous thing.

As I reflect on the privilege and honor of being a pastor through 2016, it is truly a blessing to be able to witness the "enormous thing" that the beloved members of this congregation and this very community of faith have offered to me and those whom our ministry has impacted. In our registrar's report you can see the members of Palm who entered eternal life in 2016. In addition to those services I was also asked to serve as officiant at the memorials of Lenvil Blevins, Charles Erb, Jeanette Gerhart, Lisa Ludlow Votaw, and Will Moyer. For these members of our wider family and community, as well as our sisters and brothers in Christ from this congregation, I continue to pray for God's blessed comfort, amazing grace, and hope.

Even in the midst of difficult losses, though, are also joys, moments that remind us that we are on a journey of faith, leading us to hope. Soon into the New Year, I was delighted to officiate at the wedding of Ashley (Dolloff) and Grant Pluta down in Philadelphia. It was a beautiful day of celebration and I am so grateful to have had the opportunity to be a part of the beginning of their journey as husband and wife.

In February we welcomed Frieden's UCC in Sumneytown to our combined Lenten services, which kicked off at Palm, Feb 17th with our theme of "By Faith" coming from Hebrews. Noah was our focus for our first service and everyone joined in the singing of "Rise and Shine," henceforth to be known as the *Arky, Arky* song. Amusingly, that selection set off several other children's songs including motions, like "Father Abraham" with our other Lenten hosts. Palm once again hosted the (Continued p.6)

First Monday Meal at Pennsburg UCC in March, and in addition to feeding around 80 people, were also blessed to see God working through us. Palm once again had a wonderful turnout, especially amongst our Youth, for the Community Good Friday service and Stations of the Cross Walk. I was delighted to lead a devotional time with the kids Friday Evening during their lock-in.

April 24th witnessed another blessed "Music Sunday" with our choirs again all participating in this time of sacred music. Isaac Watts was our focus hymn writer for the day. I was also very excited to sing with the Men's Choir on "All to Us." Also in April our congregation shared in the baptism for Isabelle Tomlin.

May 1st I traveled to North Carolina for the 150th Anniversary of Hedrick's Grove United Church of Christ as their guest speaker. This is a congregation which my great-grandfather served and one that I connected with while on sabbatical in 2014. I adapted a hymn which Peg and I had done for Palm's 100th, which they used at their culminating worship celebration. I made my way back from Pennsylvania to attend Clergy Convocation with our keynote speaker, David Lose, presenting on the changing nature of ministry in our society. May also witnessed the wedding of Ashley (Freed) and Shane Henley, as well as beginning preparations for the Upper Perk High School Baccalaureate which I continue to help coordinate on behalf of the Upper Perk Ministerial Association, of which I am secretary.

May 15th, along with the choir of Frieden's UCC in Sumneytown, we celebrated the life and ministry of Rev. Ronald Krick, our Pastor Emeritus here at Palm, singing an anthem we had commissioned upon Ron's retirement. Our prayers continue with Bonnie and all of Ron's family, but we do rejoice in his faithfulness to the Church of Jesus Christ and the impact which he made upon Palm Schwenkfelder Church.

June saw another beautiful Father's Day service at Washington Cemetery with Suite Brass providing our music. July 2nd I officiated the wedding of John and Brooke Olson. John is a member of Central Schwenkfelder and was home on leave from his military service for July 4th weekend.

August saw the Pence family down on the North Carolina coast for some vacation time, where I unfortunately had a little too much fun on a paddleboard and sprained my right ankle (And yes for full disclosure I also lost a pair of glasses a few days before). Even though I was on crutches, had to use a stool for worship at Hosensack Meetinghouse, and couldn't get in the creek with the kids this year, it was a wonderful day to culminate our summer meeting house services.

With the coming of September, a new Confirmation class began their journey together and I continue to enjoy working with Hans, Jonas, Margo, Nicholas and Selia. September 17th, I was blessed to officiate the wedding of Rebecca (Callodonato) and Ryan Himmelwright here in our beautiful sanctuary. The end of the month saw Day of Remembrance hosted here with Rev. Leslie Kearney preaching at the afternoon service.

In October we celebrated the baptisms of Paisley Dority and Owen Zaborowski. Laity Sunday was held on Reformation Sunday this year with Ken Jacob offering a well-grounded sermon on "Justification by Grace through Faith."

With Christmas Eve on a Saturday, our morning worship was informal and included Birthday blowers and the impromptu creation of the responsive phrase "Christ is born! **Christ is born indeed!**" followed by loud honks throughout the sanctuary.

The closing reading for my Pastor's report this year is the foreward to Joseph M. Martin's <u>A</u> <u>Journey to Hope</u>. This cantata guided us through the season of Lent and completed our Easter celebration during worship. Sister Millicent Drake led a Bible Study based on the cantata which met for a brown bag lunch on Wednesdays during Lent. Looking back on 2016 "A Journey to Hope" struck me as an appropriate theme. By our faith in Jesus Christ, God is always leading us to Hope, and even through heartbreak or feeling that we are overwhelmed, we continue to be drawn together and to a deeper faith.

The journey begins.

One step of devotion, and the waters clap their hands in worship, splashing joy on the hearts of the faithful.

Another step, and Christ calls His disciples to service and ministry.

A little further now, and Jesus calls to the sick, weary and burdened. Together they begin a parade of life, marching across the dusty landscape of Galilee.

The road delivers the pilgrims to the walled city of Jerusalem, filled with palms and psalms and shouts of "Hosanna!"

Just beyond the city walls, the winding path finds an upper room. The road-weary warriors of peace realize a moment to rest, refresh and reflect. In the hushed and mysterious chant of the ancient rituals of Passover, they learn of a new Way; a thoroughfare paved with grace and mercy that leads through the wilderness and to the Promised Land.



A monthly budget figure of \$17,666.66 was calculated as the sum of average monthly budget amounts. The \$267,370.10 total actual income of these categories exceeded the \$212,000.00 budgeted income by \$55,370.10.

In 2016, the Diaconate continued to strive to meet the spiritual needs of the Palm Schwenkfelder Church congregation, beginning with a reception on January 10th for new and continuing officers serving Palm Church in leadership.

In February, the Deacons sponsored Valentines for the shut-ins. Church members contributed cards and treats and the deacons mailed or delivered bags of Valentine goodies to shut-ins.

The deacons assisted other church members with the "First Monday" meal at Pennsburg UCC, serving a ham dinner in March. Palm youth provided musical entertainment. The congregation also helped by baking delicious desserts, which were much enjoyed by the attendees. A "Change Our Hearts" monetary collection was taken on the Sundays in Lent to cover the cost of the meal. Thanks to the congregation for their generosity towards this worthwhile project. Palm plans to again be the host for the meal in March of 2017.

During Lent, we co-hosted refreshments with the Ladies' Aid for the community Lenten service held at Palm. In celebration of Palm Sunday, palm leaves were distributed to the congregation after the service. The deacons hosted a covered dish breakfast following the Easter Dawn Service.

In acknowledgement of Mother's Day, Father's Day, and Memorial Day, carnations were distributed on those Sundays. On Memorial Day weekend we observed Pentecost with Communion. At the conclusion of the service, the congregation walked to the cemetery for a short service of remembrance for those who had died in the past year.

The deacons hosted worship services at each of the three meeting house sites during the summer months, serving refreshments at Kraussdale Meetinghouse in July and Hosensack in August. The worship service at Kraussdale included a rededication of the building, which has been renovated this year. Thanks to Rev. David Luz, who conducted a hymnsing during the worship hour at Hosensack.

The deacons organized the Day of Remembrance Sunday school hour, featuring a slide presentation by Rev. David Luz of sites in Silesia. Palm Church hosted the afternoon celebration of The Schwenkfelder Church, also providing the traditional meal of bread and apple butter following the service.

For Harvest Home, we decorated the front of the sanctuary with food and seasonal items and fruit trays we then delivered to our shut-ins, as well as cards which were sent to those at a distance. In November the deacons took part in Laity Sunday. We thank Ken Jacob and Gail Brown for presenting the sermon and children's sermon, respectively.

The Deacons are forming a partnership with Church World Service, based in Lancaster, to assist in refugee settlement. We will begin by serving as a Hospitality Team for legal, Christian refugees arriving in our area. The congregation has assisted in this humanitarian effort with donations of household items and funds. We are awaiting the call from CWS with a family in need of housing.

At the end of the year, Christmas cards were signed and mailed to sick and shut-in members, as well as the church staff, in appreciation of their hard work all through the year.





- Mailing Christmas greetings to church members and families living at a distance



Endowment for Continuing Education 2016

The Palm Schwenkfelder Church's "Endowment for Continuing Education" was established in 1994. It's purpose is to make scholarship funds available to members of our church who are seeking to further their education beyond the high school level. Our scholarship may be awarded to one or more high school graduates per year. As a criterion for obtaining this financial assistance our students are encouraged to remain active within the church family and to contribute their time and talents to the church's broader mission. Many of our past applicants have also participated in successful projects throughout the greater community.

Each year, graduating high school students are informed by mail of the availability of scholarship applications, which may be obtained through the church office beginning on June 1. Applications must be completed and received (including required references) by the church office no later than August 1, following secondary school graduation. Information submitted with the completed applications remains confidential. A copy of the scholarship guidelines is always available upon request at the church office.

This annual scholarship award is made possible through interest earned from invested Endowment for Continuing Education funds. Since we strive to assist in supporting as many students as possible during future years, your gifts to this endowment fund are always welcomed. With your generous support, we will leave a lasting legacy through our students.

Our scholarship recipient for 2016 is Victoria Anne Leh. Victoria is enrolled as a Biology major in a four year Bachelor of Science degree program at St. Mary's University in San Antonio, Texas. This course of study will precede a two year Master of Science degree program, since Victoria plans to pursue a career as a Physician's Assistant. Our applicant achieved a class rank of 10th and a grade point average of 3.95 at Brandywine Heights High School. Her extracurricular activities at Brandywine Heights included band, chorus, field hockey, student council, Student Connections Committee, Eco Action Club and German Club. She also served as her class treasurer. In addition to her afternoon academic curriculum at Brandywine, Victoria studied during weekday mornings at the Reading Hospital School of Health Sciences, at Reading Hospital's shadowing program and at the local campus of Penn State University.
