Pastor's Pause—"For They Were Afraid"

When the sabbath was over, Mary Magdalene, and Mary the mother of James, and Salome bought spices, so that they might go and anoint him. And very early on the first day of the week, when the sun had risen, they went to the tomb. They had been saying to one another, 'Who will roll away the stone for us from the entrance to the tomb?' When they looked up, they saw that the stone, which was very large, had already been rolled back. As they entered the tomb, they saw a young man, dressed in a white robe, sitting on the right side; and they were alarmed. But he said to


them, 'Do not be alarmed; you are looking for Jesus of Nazareth, who was crucified. He has been raised; he is not here. Look, there is the place they laid him. But go, tell his disciples and Peter that he is going ahead of you to Galilee; there you will see him, just as he told you.' So they went out and fled from the tomb, for terror and amazement had seized them; and they said nothing to anyone, for they were afraid.
(Mark 16:1-8)



Scripture which begins this article is the Easter Account of Christ's resurrection in the Gospel according to Mark. If you take a look at this story in your Bible you will most

likely find a note somewhere, stating that some authorities end the Gospel right there at verse eight, others add a shorter ending, and some add in verses 9 to 20. Admittedly verse eight is an abrupt ending, and leaving the group who were the first witnesses of Christ's resurrection simply in fear and not saying anything, doesn't exactly lead, to Jesus' resurrection appearances and ascension, the spread of the Good News, and the sharing of the Spirit with the Church. But I must also admit that I like the open-endedness of that verse eight and its honesty. "For they were afraid." Here at Palm Easter is a





Caspar's Corner — Letters from Missionary Flora Heebner

Throughout the first half of the 20th century, Flora Heebner, Schwenkfelder missionary in China, was very much a part of the life of members of the Schwenkfelder churches. Flora was an en-

thusiastic letter writer. She wrote to members of her extended family, Sunday School classes, various ladies' fellowship groups, and many individuals in all our Schwenkfelder Churches. Her letters were sure to encourage the support and prayers of the home churches in her work. They also brought home the many obstacles she faced as well as the accomplishments of her ministry. One such letter dated October 25, 1914, expressed in these words her considerable passion for the children of her mission, "*Poor children untouched by Western civilization. Their feet are still being bound. They are still being engaged [to be married] in their tender*

teens, and hidden behind closed doors. There are still with us those who are sold as slaves and those who fill the place of discarded wives. But in the black depths that I have indicated, light seems to be shining, but it is but a dawning light and the day is slow in coming. But it is coming!"

A subsequent letter introduced one of these children for the folks back home:

January 3, 1915:

There is the dearest pet in the Hospital now. The little slave girl who came in a frightened being a few short months ago. Oh, she was in such agony and terror and fear lest the "foreign devils" use hidden acts of torture to add to her already overflowing cup of suffering. This morning she was carried into church on a stretcher her face all smiles and the sweetest confidence. She just knows everything is all right. The [government] official called on the Hemingways [other missionaries working with Flora] and interested himself in this case of brutality. He went to see the child and asked questions about her life and the people who had her.

What a blessing, if because of this one slave's suffering their lot would be lightened because the state won't permit human life to be held so lightly.

Later in the year, Flora reported more positive news of this unfortunate orphan:

October 22, 1915:

Remember the little slave girl I wrote about last winter. She is called "Sunshine" now. After

the operation in the hospital which meant the amputation of a foot and arm, our poor little slave girl came out of the anesthetic into a new world. I had left her on the operating table mercifully unconscious.

It was days before I could bring myself to see her again. When I did enter the ward

where she was, there she sat on the bed, with a big, bright smile. She just compelled us to go up to her, pat her dear head and ask her if she was well. Her bright gentle reply was, "Well." It was only a matter of a few weeks when we met her on the path leading to the "Doctor" house, crawling along on one hand and knees, looking up with that fascinating smile of confidence. And one Sunday, about a month after the operations, she came pegging her way along on a wooden leg to Children's Sunday School. Then the day came when she was all well, and could leave the Hospital. There was only one place to which she could go, and that was our "Precious Dew Girls' School." The Hospital matron brought her over. When "Happiness" saw her coming, she went out to meet her, put her steadying arm about her shoulders and helped her up the steps. Every one crowded around her and she did turn shy all at once and become frightened.

We thought that the clouds would hide our "Sunshine" and we

happen. But "Happiness" is a bighearted girl, pure gold. She took the poor motherless lamb under her wing and after a few days the "Sunshine" was as bright as ever. It was good to look out into the yard and see the folks one after the other piloting the little dear around and picking this girl (of twelve years) up bodily sometimes and helping her up steps and over rough places with her untrained new leg.

Flora went on to report that the local Magistrate in Tai Ku took an interest in the case and helped ensure the little girl's freedom and support from both a "cruel mistress" and a promised fiancé who was threatening to bring trouble to her life. Flora concludes her story with these words: "We bespeak your prayers that she may come to know and love Him who saved her for Himself. Very Sincerely. Flora K. Heebner."

"The Building of Palm Schwenkfelder Church"



pretty big celebration, as it should be. There is brass, great singing, voices joined together in Easter Alleluias, and the affirmation that "Christ is risen, indeed!" We don't talk about fear on Easter much, but the truth is that Mary Magdalene, Mary the mother of James, and Salome's reaction to the news that Jesus was raised is understandable. These women of faith and service who went to take

care of Jesus' body, worried about not being able to move the stone so they could get in the tomb, are not all that different from us when we truly encounter the presence and power of God. We are elated with hope and promise, but we also recognize that the whole world and our very lives have been forever changed, and that scares us! The transformative power of God's Spirit that calls each of us and binds us together in Christ's death and resurrection, draws us to depths we cannot fathom nor comprehend. God's grace changes our very being, and that is a scary reality.

But this resurrection moment, in which we are invited to share, not only on Easter Sunday but every day, is an even greater reality, one that outshines all of our fears, all of our sins and shortcomings, all of our ways of death which keep us from fully embracing God. As we share in the glorious celebration of our Savior's resurrection may we all know this Easter Hope!
Christ is risen!
Christ is risen, indeed!






The current school year has brought a new Head Teacher/Director to the Palm Country Day School (PCDS). Meredith Reinhart served as the assistant teacher last school year in preparation for her appointment as the Head Teacher/Director this year. Meredith lives in East Greenville, PA, and is married to Randy Reinhart. They have two sons, Owen and Thayden. Meredith, and both her sons, attended Palm Country Day School. An Upper Perkiomen High School graduate, Meredith attended Kutztown University where she majored in Education.

Meredith began to work with children immediately upon graduation from high school. She served as a camp director for the Upper Perk YMCA, as a special education assistant at Eyer Middle School, and as an early interventionist for BARC in Reading, where she worked with children under the age of three, focusing on speech. 

T R U S T E E S ' T I D B I T S

- The Board of Trustees will hire a company to repair and clean the mausoleum located in the Palm Cemetery this spring. A thorough investigation by Palm members and Bill Wenz, owner of Earl Wenz Monuments Inc., Breinigsville, PA, has revealed extensive water damage to both the interior and exterior of the mausoleum. Marble panels covering the interior walls have bowed tremendously, making it hazardous to enter the mausoleum. In addition, the exterior exhibits missing or loose caulk, which is leading to the internal water damage. The plans for restoration include removing the interior marble panels and stabilizing the interior, as well as acid washing the exterior, removing the old caulking material, and replacing it with new, silicone caulking, plus reinforcing some of the exterior joints. The mausoleum was built in the 1930s by Elmer Krauss Schultz and houses the remains of four individuals.
- With the installation of our new propane-fueled boiler, the Church now has two, used oil tanks for sale. Please contact Alex Jalowy for more technical information about the tanks. If interested in purchasing the tanks, please contact Anne Goda.
- The "Over the Hill Gang Too" will undertake its first project when the weather improves. It will involve the thinning of the hedges at Hosensack Meetinghouse. If interested in participating in this or future projects, contact Doug Wallinger or Walt Master.
