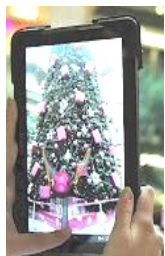
Children's Christmas Program

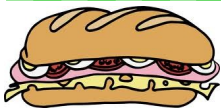

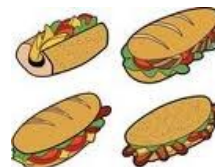


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Refreshments and Youth Hoagie Fundraiser

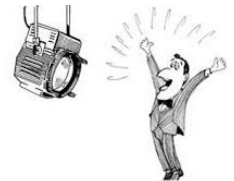

Advent/Christmas Prayers



This Advent/Christmas season the Palm Mission Board would like you to keep in your prayers two churches in Japan that have experienced tragedy from the tsunami, the earthquake and/or the nuclear disaster. We have put together a card shower to show our ongoing support for them as they continue to minister and witness in a highly



stressful environment. We have been matched by our missionary in Sendai, Japan, Jeffrey Mensendiek.





The Shiogama Higashi Church was established in 1930, has a membership of 10 (Japanese church membership tends to be small) and is pastored by Rev. Masaru Tsumura. At the time of the tsunami many areas of Shiogama were devastated. The church however is upon a hill, so did not suffer any direct damage. However, all around the church was destroyed. **Their prayer concerns** include prayers for church members who have been greatly affected by the disaster of 2011 and that the word of God will be shared with people in the area, and that the church will be able to carry some of the burdens of those who are suffering.

Sendai Hosana Church was established in 1880, has a membership of 56, and is pastored by the Rev. Atsushi Nagao. Sendai Hosana Church is the oldest church in the conference. The parsonage was badly damaged due to the earthquake, and the pastor and his family had to live in temporary housing until the parsonage was rebuilt. In January, they were able to dedicate the new parsonage. During and after the disaster, the Hosana Church helped to house volunteers who came to volunteer with the relief effort of the Fukushima nuclear disaster through the Emmaus Center (the center Jeffrey runs). This year some of the pillars of the church died. **Their prayer concerns** include that the faith will be passed onto the following generations, that the comfort and love of God will be granted to all members of the church and that the children who attend church will be nurtured in the faith and will one day be baptized.

Please keep in your prayers these two congregations. We pray that God will bring joy into our lives as we share in fellowship through prayer.

Caspar's Corner — Joshua Schultz

The Schwenkfelders and the Schwenkfelder Society went through many changes throughout the nineteenth century. Pastoral leadership was important as they made their way through these

changes and a case can certainly be made that the most significant Pastor/Leader of the group during these challenging times was Rev. Joshua Schultz. He was also the first Schwenkfelder Pastor of whom we have photographs.

Born in 1808 on a farm in Upper Hanover Township near the train station in Palm, he was the great-grandson of immigrants George and Anna Hoffman Schultz. He was fortunate to be sent to a private academy in Chestnut Hill and there he studied English, Latin,

higher Mathematics and Astronomy, among other courses of study. Following his own graduation from the academy, he taught in the public schools. The *Genealogical Record of the Schwenkfelder Families* states that "...Joshua Schultz became a great lover of books and literature, an industrious reader, and being gifted with a comprehensive mind and a retentive memory, he soon acquired a great deal of general information and knowledge, of which he made good use during his life."

He married Anna Schultz in 1835 and together they had five children, four who survived to marry and raise families of their own. His father provided him a farm which he worked throughout his life. For many years the Schwenkfelder Society in the Upper District sought to call Joshua to the ministry. In 1827, the minutes of the General Conference tell us he was elected as a teacher for the children. In 1833, Joshua was elected to the position of Pastor. But each time, his father would not allow him to serve. Finally, in 1842, when once

again called by the community to serve, Joshua disobeyed his father's wishes and, at the age of 38, he accepted the call to the Schwenkfelder ministry in the Upper District.

It isn't very clear why Joshua's father David was opposed to his serving as a Pastor, but his opposition was expressed in his will which he changed shortly after Joshua accepted the call.

The will, which is in the collection of the Heritage Center, makes Joshua and his brother Rueben, co-executors. Joshua's farm, however, was not willed to him, but to Joshua's heirs and so, throughout Joshua's life, he never owned the farm on which he made his living. This will Joshua

contested in the county court and brought in the Schwenkfelder Society to bear upon Reuben to change the will, but after many years of indecision, the will was upheld as written. As a result of this controversy between Joshua and his brother – and ultimately, between the Society and Reuben – the Schwenkfelder Society struck Reuben and his wife from the membership roles of the Society.

Joshua accomplished many things during his 50 years as one of the three pastors of the Upper District of the Schwenkfelder Society, the most important being his role in printed by-laws for the Schwenkfelder Society. First printed in German in 1851, he translated the bylaws into English and printed that in 1882. His work in gathering together the various formal motions passed at General Conference meetings since 1782 laid the foundation for what we know today as The Schwenkfelder Church. He was the first Pastor to create and maintain a membership list for the Schwenkfelder Society. His list of members in the Upper District dates from 1851. He was in favor of the reinstatement of

Communion in Schwenkfelder worship and wrote about his views in a small printed pamphlet. Later, he also printed a pamphlet of writings by George Weiss and Balthasar Hoffman, the first two Schwenkfelder Pastors in America, to support his position. He was not shy about expressing his Schwenkfelder faith and entered into an extended public exchange of letters in the *Neutralist*, a German language newspaper printing in Skippack, in 1858 with

Rev. Daniel Weiser, Pastor of the New Goshenhoppen Reformed Church in East Greenville. Upholding and explaining his deeply held convictions, he stressed Schwenkfelder themes throughout the correspondence including the Glorification of Christ, reading Scripture spiritually, proclaiming a spiritual interpretation of the Lord's Supper, and stating his belief in adult baptism.

The exchange was subsequently printed in 1861.

Throughout his fifty years of very active ministry he witnessed the first Genealogical Record of Schwenkfelder Families (published in 1879), the beginnings of the *Corpus Schwenkfeldianorum* project (1884), the reinstatement of Communion in the Worship Service (about 1888) and the discovery and purchase of the Schwenckfeld Bible in 1890.

He died in 1892 at the age of 84 during a funeral

service for one of his parishioners in the pulpit of the Kraussdale Meetinghouse – the very same pulpit in which he preached his first sermon.

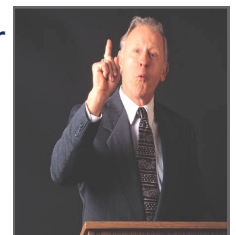

Schwenkfelder Life in Pennsylvania before 1780

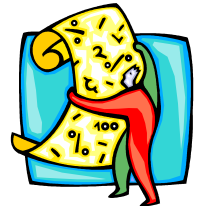

On Sunday December 1st, we begin the Advent Season, once again preparing ourselves for the celebration of our Savior's birth, and making the spiritual journey with God's gifts of Peace, Hope, Love, and Joy that we might be ready to receive the greatest gift the world has ever known. In preparing my December newsletter article I was captivated by that sense of Advent Peace. Too often in my own, often intense, desire for peace, I want to define this gift of God as the absence of conflict, the feeling that everything is right in the world, and the strong sense that I can be at ease. I want Peace to be my day at the beach, where worries slip into the tide to be carried to who knows where, and every day is new.

I admit that I am a beach person, but to be honest, a day at the beach isn't always a carefree, peace-filled picnic. There are preparations you have to make before heading out, sunscreen has to be applied, items have to be gathered, children have to get

ready, the bathroom has to be visited, stuff has to be carried over. Then on the beach the umbrella must be set up, youngsters have to be watched, and the adventurous youth like my children must be watched even more closely! There are other people that you have to be aware of too, others "enjoying" a day at the beach, music being played that might be louder than you like, fishing lines and hooks out in the water. There is the reapplication process of sunscreen upon wet, sandy skin, attempting repeat-



edly to get the kids out of the water so you can go have lunch, carrying all the stuff back over to the house, trying to get as much sand off as possible, and then the whole process starts all over again!

And yet, in the midst of all the responsibilities and worries, the preparations and complaints, the distractions, nuisances, and irritations, I still love being at the beach and experience a profound sense of peace and relaxation while I am there. This peace is not defined by the circumstances that surround the particular moment, but rather is grounded in my intention to enjoy this day as fully as possible, to be fully present with those around me, and to be open to the surprises that the waves might bring in.

During this Advent Season, may we all be blessed to know the gift of God's Peace as we journey toward the humble manger of our Savior's birth.



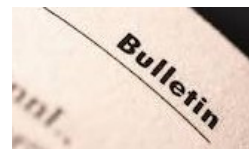


Altar Flower Sponsorship Announcement

Alternative Christmas Idea

Ariel Royer is a member of New Goshenhoppen UCC in East Greenville, PA. Since October 2, 2013 she has been serving as a Global Mission Intern with the Greek Orthodox Patriarchate of Jerusalem/Orthodox Initiative, a ministry of the Greek Orthodox Church set up initially to assist with the Iraqi refugee population in Jordan. She is based in Amman and serves as



assistant for Refugee Response and Communications with the Initiative to enhance their communications with people outside of the situation in Jordan and beyond.

This winter, the Orthodox Initiative is hoping to distribute winter coats, cook stoves and food parcels to 1000 families. Jordan has officially welcomed over half-a-million Syrian refugees. Another 500,000 Syrian refugees are estimated to be in Jordan but are not currently registered, due to fear or lack of access. The refugees are residing in refugee camps and in local communities. Many of the Syrian refugees cannot afford to send their children to school and although they are trying to work to feed themselves and their displaced families.

Local communities have been sharing the very large burden that the government is already shouldering, in helping to care for these new arrivals. Many locals are helping the Syrian families in acquiring their daily bread. The Greek Orthodox Initiative feels that it is our moral duty as Christians and our Christian witness, to help the strangers, receive them, feed them and visit them.

With your help, we will ease the harsh winter ahead by distributing essential items like stoves, winter clothing and food parcels to the most vulnerable victims of the Syrian civil war.

The goal is simple:

1,000 Stoves	\$60 each	\$60,000
1000 Winter Clothing Bundles	\$55 each	\$55,000
1,000 Food Parcels	\$50 each	\$50,000
