

Caspar's Corner—Two Pillars of the Schwenkfelder Church

The editorial of the February, 1927, Schwenkfeldian included these words regarding two "Pillars" of the Schwenkfelder Church who died in the same year, 1926:

Two strong pillars of our denomination have fallen, in the deaths of our brethren, John H. Schultz and Amos S. Anders...

Two strong pillars of our denomination have fallen, in the deaths of our brethren, John H. Schultz and Amos S. Anders, the former being the Moderator of the Denomination and the latter its Treasurer. Truly, "Their works do follow them," and "They have served their day and generation." These familiar figures in our conferences and counsels we took

for granted. That is, we almost came to assume that they were permanent and indispensable, for wherever work was to be done, there they were with sympathetic heart, sane mind and ready purse. For them the work of the Church was above their business. They realized fundamentally that serving the Lord is life's first business. What a challenge now to younger men, to assume the important duties that they have left!

Who were these two Pillars of the Schwenkfelder church, John H. Schultz and Amos S. Anders? This *Caspar's Corner* looks at these two "giants" of The Schwenkfelder Church of the 1920s and offers inspiration for us in our time as we serve our churches with faith and diligence.

Amos S. Anders, of East Norriton Township, was born in 1855 in Worcester to parents Abraham and Rebecca (Schultz) Anders. He married Ada Harding in

1890 and they had one child, John Harding Anders. He was a progressive farmer always interested in the affairs of the Schwenkfelder Church. He grew up and was active in the Worcester Schwenkfelder Church and Sunday School. where he served in many official capacities for many years including the organist when an organ was first placed in the Sunday School. When The Schwenkfelder Church incorporated as a denomination in 1911, he was elected Treasurer and served in that position with fidelity and ear-

nestness until his death. His quiet, pleasing personality always brought a benediction to church meetings. He had a smile and a pleasant word for all. During his entire life he labored zealously for the Master's Kingdom, and in discharging the duties of Treasurer of The Schwenkfelder Church, he brought the same dignity and respect to the office that pervaded his entire life. The Board of Trustees of The Schwenkfelder Church recalled the faithful attendance of Mr. Anders at its meetings and his expressions of the desire to perform the duties of his office to the satisfaction of all. His financial statements of the various funds in his care were always clear and accurate, and carefully copied for presentation to the Secretary.

John H. Schultz was the son of Andrew and Magdalena Shultz, born at Clayton, Berks County in 1855. He attended Kutztown State Normal School and taught school several years in Hereford Township. For several years he "pioneered" in Florida and homesteaded a farm. After his return from Florida, he married (Continued next page)

Ellen Meschter Anders in 1880, with whom he had eight children. Following her death he married Susanna Schultz in 1916. For 30 years Mr. Schultz conducted a farm in East Norriton Township and during this period he was very active in any enterprise that would be beneficial to the life and welfare of the community. In 1911 he moved to Norristown. In 1905 he organized the Reading Bone Fertilizer Company and was president until his death. He was a director of the Penn Trust Company, a director of the Farmers' Market, and for a number of years a member of the State Board of Agriculture. All through his life he took an active part in church work. He was a member of the Norristown Schwenkfelder Church, a teacher of the Friendly Bible class of the Sunday School and for many years a teacher of the adult class in the Worcester Schwenkfelder Sunday School. At the time of his death he was moderator of The Schwenkfelder Church (elected in 1918) and president of the board of Home and Foreign Missions of the Schwenkfelder Church. He was also a member of the Board of Publication of the Schwenkfelder Church and treasurer of its various funds. For 20 years he was a trustee of the Perkiomen School and a member of the house committee.
