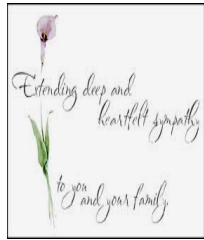

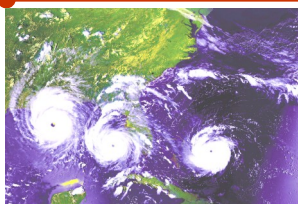

Caspar's Corner — Schwenckfeld's Portrait #1

One of the treasures of the Schwenckfelder Library & Heritage Center is a 1556 portrait of Caspar Schwenckfeld for which he sat five years before his death in 1561. The story of how this portrait came into the

One of the treasurers of the Schwenckfelder Library & Heritage Center is a 1556 portrait of Caspar Schwenckfeld for which he sat five years before his death in 1561.

Heritage Center collection and the story of the portrait itself is the theme for this Caspar's Corner three part series.

In 1905, Dr. Boehme of the University of Bonn, Germany, sent a handful of his Reformation students to Wolfenbüttel to talk to

Dr. Hartranft, Dr. Johnson, and the other members of the *Corpus Schwenckfeldianorum* staff in order that they might gain some first-hand information on Caspar Schwenckfeld. Eight years later, in November, 1913, one of these students, Adolf Wessler, a Vicar in the Lutheran Church, while visiting the small village of Beyharting, made the acquaintance of physician Dr. Hans Krauss. At his home Wessler saw an oil portrait of Caspar Schwenckfeld and with an amazing amount of foresight contacted Dr. Elmer E.S. Johnson about this discovery. Dr. Johnson noted in his diary some time later "...that Krauss did not know who the person was represented by the portrait." Correspondence between Dr. Krauss and Dr. Johnson began shortly after and a photograph of the portrait was sent to Dr. Johnson.

In May of 1914, Dr. Johnson and Selina Gerhard found themselves traveling near Munich on *Corpus* business. On Saturday, May 23, Dr. Johnson makes the following entry in his diary:

...took an auto to Beyharting to see Dr. Hans Krauss the present owner of the Schwenckfeld portrait. We were received by Mrs. Krauss and later Dr. Krauss himself appeared and then produced the Schwenckfeld portrait. It is only slightly larger than the photograph I got and it is painted on wood with a number of worm-

holes on the back. It is a very good picture. When I approached him about buying it he wanted to know what I would pay and I responded

by saying I would first have to know how much he wanted for it. He said that he would have to consult his cousin in Augsburg... After coffee Selina and I took leave and rode back in our car to Bad Aibling where we...ordered two more prints of the C.S. portrait and paid 5.2 Mks. for them.

Three days later, May 26, now in Augsburg, they called upon Dr. Krauss' cousin, and Dr. Johnson wrote this in his diary regarding the visit:

Hofrat (Court Councilor) Dr. Schreiber was very nice but said he would advise him (Dr. Krauss) to have it valued at the gallery in Munich. I objected because it would at once open competition which I could not enter. But the Hofrat thought I need have no fear from that quarter. He was very nice and said he would write his Vetter (cousin) to sell it to the Schwenckfelders in preference to a museum here where it could have little interest.

By August, 1914, Dr. Krauss had the portrait appraised at a value of 3000 Marks and was willing to accept 1000 Marks as a down payment.

But this was too high a price for Dr. Johnson and he said no. In September, Dr. Krauss had reduced his price to 2000 Marks and noted that by receiving this sum, old Schwenckfeld would in this manner – 353 years after his death – do the fatherland a service. Krauss also stated at this time that he had stored the portrait in a vault in Augsburg.

But by this time, WWI had broken out and all the world, it seems, was focused on other things, as was Dr. Johnson and Dr. Krauss. Occasional correspondence continued for several years, but the portrait remained in Dr. Krauss' possession.

Next month we'll learn about a copy which was commissioned and the eventual purchase of the Schwenckfeld portrait.

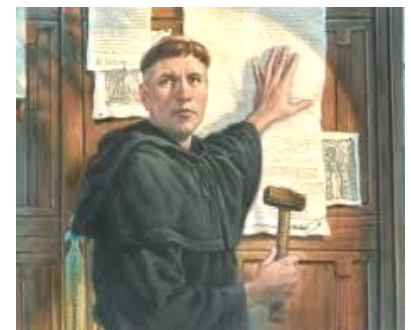

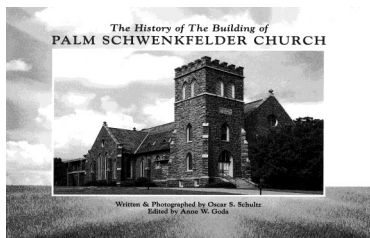

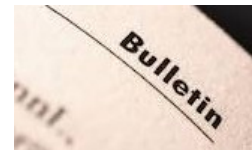


100th Anniversary Book
