Pastor's Pause—Ascension Day

*In the first book, Theophi*lus, I wrote about all that Jesus did and taught from the beginning until the day when he was taken up to heaven, after giving instructions through the Holy Spirit to the apostles whom he had chosen. After his suffering he presented himself alive to them by many convincing proofs, appearing to them over the course of forty days and speaking about the kingdom of God. While staying with them, he ordered them not to leave Jerusalem, but to wait there for the promise of the Father. 'This', he said, 'is what you have

heard from me; for John baptized with water, but you will be baptized with the Holy Spirit not many days from now.'

So when they had come together, they asked him, 'Lord, is this the time when you will restore the kingdom to Israel?' He replied, 'It is not for you to know the times or periods that the Father has set by his own authority. But you will receive power when the Holy Spirit has come upon you; and you will be my witnesses in Jerusalem, in all Judea and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth.' When he had said this, as they were watching, he was lifted up, and a cloud took him out of their sight. While he was going and they were gazing up towards heaven, suddenly two men in white robes stood by them. They said, 'Men of Galilee, why do you stand looking up towards heaven? This Jesus, who has been taken up from you into heaven, will come in the same way as

you saw him go into heaven.' (Acts 1:1-11) The fortieth day of Easter on the liturgical calendar marks the observance of Ascension Day. Since that always falls on a Thursday, here at Palm we normally uplift (pun completely intended) the Ascension of Jesus Christ on a Sunday either before or after the actual date. The Scripture reading which opens this article is the account of Jesus' ascension according to Acts. Our Ascension Day (Cont. on p. 6)







Caspar's Corner — Spring General Conference, May 20, 1916

The June 1916 Schwenkfeldian editorial begins: "The Spring session of our General Conference held in the Palm Church on May 20, was one of the shortest sessions held since the adoption of the new Formula of Church Government [adopted in 1909]. As all the departments of the church were reported to be in good running or-

der, the business of the Conference was conducted with great dispatch." As our Spring General Conference is being held this month, this Caspar's Corner will take a look at what happened 100 years ago.

After being called to order at Palm Schwenkfelder Church, the first order of business was the assurance that all Districts were represented with delegations – Districts at this time included the Upper District (Palm Church) Middle District (Central Church), and the Philadelphia District. As Norristown Church was still a mission at this time, they were operating under the authority of the Mission Board. It was reported that all Boards and church Departments were "flourishing" and combined church membership for the year was given at 1,072, an increase of 29 over the preceding year. Total running expenses for all the churches reached \$5,044.87, an increase over the \$4,606.90 as reported at last year's Conference.

A report was presented by Rev. Levi Hoffman, Pastor Middle District, regarding the mission in Lansdale: the Sunday School and religious services, which had been begun in the early part of 1916. Following this enthusiastic report, it was the "unanimous opinion of the Middle District and the General Conference of May 20th that Mission Work be started and supported in Lansdale." A following article states that shortly thereafter, "the Mission Board as the au-

thorized agents of the General Conference, has purchased a lot in Lansdale on the North East Corner of Main Street and Towamencin Avenue, as a site for a future church edifice." Surely a dramatic action for a short General Conference session!

Officers of Conference were re-elected for another year of service: Moderator, Elmer K. Schultz, Secretary, Jesse H. Snyder, Jr., Treasurer, Amos S. Anders; Board of Trustees: Middle Dis-

trict, Hiram K. Kriebel and David K. Heebner, Upper District: Benneville S. Schultz and Milton S. Schultz, Philadelphia District: George K.

Heebner and Harry C. Miles: Board of Publication: Charles S. Anders; Board of Missions: Joseph K. Schultz; Board of Charities: Wm. H. Anders; Board of Trustees of Perkiomen Seminary: Elmer K. Schultz, Daniel M. Anders, Josephus Gerhard, and William H. Seipt.

The following actions are reported to have happened one after the other with little discussion:

- The Conference adopted a resolution of appreciation for Hon. Samuel W. Pennypacker (former Pennsylvania Governor) for the interest he has always manifested in Schwenkfeld History, and expressed their sympathy for him during his present illness, and the hope for his speedy recovery.
- It was decided to hold the next General Conference in the Palm Church on Saturday, October 21, 1916.
- On account of September 24, coming on Sunday this year, it was decided to hold the annual Memorial Day services

been subscribed for with three more expected to be subscribed to shortly. One, it was noted, was subscribed by the end of Conference.

The final note regarding the 1916 Conference was that during the evening session (when was an "evening session" a part of the Spring General Conference?), "some very fine music was rendered under the direction of Miss Freda Kriebel. after which Dr. Isaac Sharpless, president of Haverford College gave an address on William Penn and the early history of the settlement of Pennsylvania by the Quakers."

A short business meeting, perhaps, but a full Conference session was held.

Easter and Ascension Day lead us to Pentecost, and our new birth as Christ's Church. May Ascension Day this year be a time of preparation for us as we more fully welcome the Spirit into our lives and this blessed community.

Chester County Migrant Ministries Donations Drive

Since the 1970s, migrant farm workers, and their families, have arrived in the area to harvest a variety of crops. Most of these migrants live and work year-round in the area, and they arrive with very little



to their names. Typically, they come unprepared for the colder northern temperatures. In addition, the

majority have not learned English, which makes it difficult to ask for help and receive various services.

Palm Schwenkfelder Church participates in the annual drive to collect basic necessities. Palm Schwenkfelder Mission Board would like to invite you to participate in our annual drive through **May 22, 2016.**

Current needs include:

Health Kits: Toothbrushes/toothpaste, bath towels, wash cloths, disposable razors, soap (Ivory, med. size), pocket mirrors, toilet paper, plastic coffee cups, heavy plastic ware, shaving cream, combs and women's feminine products. Other items needed: new/used blankets (used blankets must be clean and in good condition), first aid kits, paperbacks, Spanish/English dictionaries, and Bibles.
