

## Caspar's Corner— Inspiring the Schwenkfelders to Action

In the first decades of the twentieth century, one of the most significant projects on the minds of our Schwenkfelder Church forebears was the work of the *Corpus Schwenckfeldianorum* –

the scholarly publication of all the writings by Caspar Schwenckfeld von Ossig. At the 1915 Spring General Conference of the Schwenkfelder Church, Professor Howard W. Kriebel, from Palm Church, made a lengthy report (four full pages) which was printed in the June 1915 Schwenkfeldian as, "A Few Thoughts Concerning the Corpus Schwenckfeldianorum." In his report he states, "Of the more direct initiative influences from without [the Schwenkfelder Society] that cannot be overlooked there must be mentioned, among others..." and he lists some names. This Caspar's Corner introduces these people who, from outside the Schwenkfelder Society, influenced the Society members to take on this immense task which was to have such a profound effect on our church in the early twentieth century.

Heinrich August Friedrich Schneider - As a student at the University of Berlin about 1835, he was inspired to study the Schwenkfelders. Over the course of 35 years, he accumulated a vast collection of material. In the early 1880s, his collection was auctioned with much of the material ending up at Hartford Theological Seminary. Today we have a substantial amount of his material in our archives, which was a major source for the Corpus editors in their efforts to locate Schwenckfeld's writings in various libraries. Also in our archives are his lists of genealogical information of the Schwenkfelders in Harpersdorf and other nearby Schwenkfelder villages at the time of the Jesuit mission.

Rev. Dr. Augustus C. Thompson – As a young theology student in Berlin, he became a roommate of H.A.F. Schneider. Many years later, in looking at some newly acquired material for the Hartford Theological Seminary library, he recognized Schneider's handwriting. He passed on the material, with strong recommendations for study, to a young professor at the Seminary, Rev Dr Chester David Hartranft.

eran of the Civil War, he was elected Governor of Pennsylvania and served from 1871 to 1879. While Governor, he became interested in genealogy and discovered his Schwenkfelder roots. In

the Harrisburg archives he located the 1734 St Andrew ship list with Schwenkfelder signatures. He participated actively in the production of the 1879 Genealogical Record of the Descendants of the Schwenkfelders. He served on a committee of the Schwenkfelder Society for preparation for the 1884 observance of the 150th anniversary of the arrival of the largest group of Schwenkfelders in Pennsylvania. He suggested a distant cousin - Rev. Dr. Chester David Hartranft - as a speaker for the occasion.

Hon. William A. Yeakel - Born in 1825 in Whitemarsh Township, PA, Yeakel started farming the family homestead in 1850. He was elected a member of the local School Board and held the office for 18 consecutive terms. In 1873 he was elected to the Pennsylvania State Senate and served one term. He was the chair of the committee which produced the 1879 Genealogical Record of the Descendants of the Schwenkfelders and then served on the committee for the 150th anniversary celebration.

### Casper's Corner (Cont.)

Hon. Christopher Heydrick – Born in Venango County in northwest Pennsylvania in 1830, Heydrick graduated from Allegheny College in 1852. He taught school in

Pennsylvania and Kentucky where he also studied law and obtained his first license to practice. He returned to Venango County in 1854 where he based a law practice which reached surrounding counties as well. After he served a term on the Supreme Court of Pennsylvania, he picked up the moniker "Judge Heydrick," by which he was known for the remainder of his life. Although not actively a part of the Schwenkfelder Society, he maintained a strong interest in his Schwenkfelder heritage throughout his life.

<u>Rev. Dr. Ernest C. Richardson</u> – Rev. Richardson was a Hartford Seminary trustee and the librarian at Princeton University. He represented the seminary on various committees related to the publication of the *Corpus*. In 1907 he traveled to Wolfenbüttel, Germany, and assisted in providing more financial and clerical resources for the effort.

And finally, Howard W. Kriebel lists "the various bodies of the Hartford Theological Seminary, and last but foremost, the colossal, dynamic and dynastic Rev. Dr. Chester D. Hartranft."

The Strong Case of the Murder of Norman Bechtel Presented by Candace Perry September 9, 2015 noon

Brown Bag Lectures Series Schwenkfelder Library and Heritage Center



On Wednesday, September 9th, come to the Schwenkfelder Library and Heritage Center to hear a presentation by Candace Perry entitled "The Strange Case of Murder of Norman Bechtel."

When Boyertown native Norman Bechtel was murdered under unusual circumstances in Philadelphia in 1932, the newspapers were quick to call it a "hex murder," similar to the slaying of Nelson Rehmeyer in York in 1928. The case went unsolved for five years as detectives pursued one false lead after another. This illustrated lecture will tell the tale of this unusual case of Bechtel's untimely death, and how the media sensationalized it.






## World Communion Sunday

Sunday, October 18<sup>th</sup> 3:00 pm

The School of Christ will take place on Sunday October 18<sup>th</sup> at Central Schwenkfelder Church from 3:00pm to 5:00pm prior to the General Conference meeting. The title of this year's program is:

"How does the Holy Spirit lead you when Exiles (Schwenkfelders) meet immigrants"?

Last year's program helped us recognize where and how the Holy Spirit has been with us in our individual lives. This year we would like to talk about the Spirit's leading regarding immigrants: those coming into our society as well as members of our society who leave to enter other societies.
